T-shirt Wrapping & Kids activities at the Block Party

A Bounce House, trees wrapped in t-shirts, smoothies and snacks, tug of war, painting, kayaks, and yoga were some of the activities that took place at the Block Party 2016.

PhotoVoice Reception

Family and friends of our young photographers and community members gathered at an exhibition to hear the stories behind the photographs which focused on everything from scenes of downtown Kearney, to landscapes, to photos of graffiti art. The photos from the 2015-2016 Photovoice classes were displayed.

The PhotoVoice project gives Buffalo County youth an opportunity to learn about their community, each other and themselves, by taking photographs and sharing the creative ideas that go into making them and the process of selecting their favorite photos for exhibition.

“Every PhotoVoice participant has their own story to tell,” says Mark Foradori, United Against Violence Coordinator who organizes the PhotoVoice Project. “The more pictures they take, the more their story and their personal point of view comes through.”

When participants add their voices in the form of captions for the photos, they often share unique and thoughtful perspectives on their photo's subjects.

Cruise Nite Preparation

The Be Safe, Be Smart Task Force started campaign planning in May. The group will be:

- 1) promoting the open container policy and additional safe tips to Kearney and surrounding communities
- 2) empowering landlords to “Be Present” by roping off property and being aware of their neighborhood surroundings
- 3) engaging landlords and property managers by sharing resources for tenant policies

A new strategy the group is using is a letter to retailers to *reduce or omit the sale of glass bottles* to promote the Be Safe, Be Smart campaign in their store for the Cruise Nite weekend. The letter was signed by Mayor Stan Clouse, Chief of Police Dan Lynch and City Councilman Jonathan Nikkila. Following Cruise Nite, the City of Kearney is going to recognize businesses who participated in these recommendations via a City Council meeting.
